

AUGUST 7TH, 2024, IS HISTORIC FOR POLO

In the wake of the individual show jumping final won by Germany's Christian Kukuk, the last equestrian competition of Paris 2024, the magic of Olympism continued today at the Chantilly Polo Club with the "rematch" of the opening game of the 1924 Paris Olympics tournament, which saw France and the USA go head-to-head. Thus concluded the best way for polo to attend the Olympic Games. The action does not stop; there is still more polo to come. That was the message.

It was a rematch that, while France was unable to avenge the 15-1 defeat from 100 years ago, showcased a team that has grown in strength and determination. The French players demonstrated remarkable skill and resilience, closing the gap to a more gratifying score of 10-7 in what was a truly respectable match. Their performance highlighted not only the progress of French polo but also the enduring spirit of sportsmanship that defines these centennial commemorations.

This event would not have been possible without the exceptional organization by France, whose efforts ensured that the spirit of the 1924 Olympics was honored

with dignity and grandeur. The Chantilly Polo Club provided a magnificent stage for this historic encounter, blending tradition with the modern elegance of the sport. The four young Americans—Quinn Evans, Hope Arellano, Nicolas Escobar, and Cody Ellis—alongside the French players Elena Venot, Dorian Bulteau, Julien Reynes, and Clément Delfosse, will all go down in history, not solely because of their participation in this significant match, but for being part of an exhibition where Polo once again took its place alongside the Olympic spirit. Both teams, with their exceptional performances, embodied the essence of this commemorative event.

Truth be told, polo as a collective will remember this day. It is history in the making, not just for the victors but for all who contributed to this momentous occasion. We hope that this marks the beginning of a new era for Polo and the Olympic Games, one where the sport can continue to thrive and inspire across borders.



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THE 2024 PARIS GAMES POLO CHALLENGE: A HISTORIC MATCH UNFOLDS

The 2024 Paris Games Polo Challenge, hosted at the prestigious Polo Club du Domaine de Chantilly, offered a remarkable spectacle that captured the essence of the sport and the Olympic spirit. The event, which paid homage to the 1924 Paris Olympics polo tournament, saw the United States and France face off in a highly anticipated rematch. Despite the passage of a century, the competitive fire burned just as fiercely on the field, with the match unfolding in a manner befitting its historic significance.

The Chantilly Polo Club, draped in the vibrant colors of the French and American flags, provided an idyllic setting for this centennial celebration. As Europe's largest polo club, it stood as a fitting venue for such a momentous occasion, which not only honored the legacy of the 1924 tournament but also showcased the modern evolution of the sport.

From the opening chukker, it was clear that this would be no ordinary match. France, eager to avenge the lopsided defeat of a century ago, showed a level of determination and resilience that kept the game intensely competitive through the first three periods. Clément Delfosse, France's captain, struck first, setting the tone with a solo effort that was quickly matched by Quinn Evans for the USA. This pattern of back-and-forth scoring kept the spectators on the edge of their seats, as the teams remained deadlocked at 5-5 by the end of the third chukker.

However, it was in the fourth chukker that the American team, leveraging their experience and strategic depth, began to pull away. Nico Escobar, the match's standout player, showcased his prowess with a series of decisive goals that ultimately secured the United States a 10-7 victory. Escobar's performance was instrumental, not only in terms of ▶

scoring but also in orchestrating the flow of the game, earning him the title of Most Valuable Player (MVP). France, despite the loss, could take pride in their valiant effort. Players like Dorian Bulteau and Julien Reynes were pivotal in keeping the game close, demonstrating skill and composure under pressure. Elena Venot, who along with Hope Arellano represented the female contingent on the field, played a crucial role in maintaining the intensity and spirit of the match. ▶

The match's conclusion saw individual honors awarded, with Nico Escobar's mare, Open Amapola, receiving the Best Playing Pony (BPP) award. The 12-year-old mare, bred by the renowned Ellerstina, exemplified the pinnacle of equine athleticism and contributed significantly to Escobar's commanding performance.

To be able to represent the United States in this game was incredibly special. It was an honor to be part of something so historical! Playing at the same time as the Paris Olympic Games made it especially unique and special.

It was my first time in France—and the French were all such welcoming and wonderful hosts! The club was stunning and it was all around a beautiful atmosphere. In the fourth chukker, we all finally clicked and we really tightened up with our men which allowed whoever had the ball more time.

Our team was in the best spirits the whole time, each day was so fun, we never stopped laughing. It means so much to be part of a team like that, it makes you want to work harder for your teammates! The entire experience was so memorable!



NICOLAS ESCOBAR, USA TEAM

It was an amazing honor as always to represent my country, but to play in that historical match was an amazing experience that I will never forget. To play in such an important match With the historical background of the Olympics being played 100 years ago in Paris Is a game that will forever be remembered.

The club is an amazing venue with beautiful Barns and well-kept fields. I could not ask for a better place to play. We also had an amazing group of supporters there which helped with the atmosphere of the game.

The big difference in the game was made in the second half as we were able to double the horses that we played in the first half. That being said, we knew the horses more in the second half and were able to secure the game. My favorite moments of the match were all of the second half when our team was in a flow state, there was no doubt in my mind that we were losing the game.

My biggest takeaway was being able to be a part of such an amazing experience with good teammates, coaches, and friends. It was great to play in front of such a large audience in France.





MATTIHEU DELFOSSE, COACH FRANCE TEAM

As the coach of the French team, both male and female, I find it very important to be able to play international test matches. We have many young players with little experience, and it is crucial for them to gain international exposure against players from other countries and of different levels.

In the European and World Championships, we have often arrived somewhat unprepared and lacking experience. In that sense, the Paris Games Polo Challenge was incredible, especially for players like Elena, Julien, and Dorian, who had the chance to live such an experience. My brother Clement is from another generation and is more accustomed to this level. It was an incredible experience overall. Before this, there was a test match between France and the "Rest of the World," and for the four girls who played, it was their first time representing the country. All of this helps us improve.

The preparation was short because we were in the middle of the season here. Elena and Clement were playing elsewhere, so we had to rent horses. Although Julien and Dorian were better organized, we didn't have much time to practice together.

We found a way to play that was different from what we had initially planned. Clement ended up playing in the back because he didn't have the horses to go forward, and we wanted Elena to play in the middle, but she ended up playing as number 1. In the end, the best-mounted players ended up playing in the middle. We had to adapt to what we could do rather than the natural position of each player.

I think we played quite well in the match. We were tied until the fourth chukker, then they took the lead, and we were able to close the gap at the end. We must highlight the level of the American team; they played really well.

The context was incredible, and I loved that it was held at the same time as the Olympic Games, which added an extra flavor to the event.

Participating in the 2024 Paris Games Polo Challenge, 100 years after the last edition, was truly an honor for me as a representative of my country, France. I experienced this commemoration, through its organization, atmosphere, and sportsmanship, as the beginnings of an Olympic event.

Its symbolic nature, its occurrence during the Paris 2024 Olympic Games, with an organization worthy of a high-level international sporting event. The uniqueness of this USA-France match also stems from the limited opportunities to play intercontinental tournaments with a fully American team.

The atmosphere was inevitably very special, as it took place at the club where I developed and progressed throughout my polo career, to which I am strongly attached. It was also very important to me to play at home for France, and for it to take place in Chantilly, an iconic polo venue in Europe founded by Patrick Guérrand-Hermès, who honored us with his presence.

Participating in the Paris Games Polo Challenge was something very special for me, firstly because I had the chance to wear the French jersey again and play for my country, and secondly because it happened during the Olympic Games. I had never experienced the Olympics so closely before, and commemorating the 100th anniversary of the first Paris Olympics was a historic moment. I've played several matches and tournaments for France, each with its own particularity. The match against the USA was a bit different, with less pressure than in a European or World Championship, for example. I saw this opportunity as a gift and tried to enjoy this unique moment as much as possible. I will remember this event as something very positive for polo and sports in general.

The atmosphere was incredible. One thing that the U.S. Polo Assn. and Chantilly did very well was organizing the match as if it were a World Championship final, so everything, from the crowd to the match itself, was super organized. These matches are always great because they help us remember those who developed our sport in the past; to see where polo was before and where it is now. These are very different times, but without the past, we wouldn't have the polo we have today. It's good to revisit our roots. It's wonderful to experience these moments to ensure that polo continues to be both a celebration and a game.

The future of polo in France is bright. With over 1,000 players and more than


30 clubs, including high-goal tournaments hosted by the Chantilly Polo Club, the Deauville Polo Club, and La Baule Polo Club, French polo is gaining prominence on the international stage. 

The Legacy of Polo in the Olympic Games: From 1924 to 2024

Polo holds a unique place in the annals of the Olympic Games. Although its time on the Olympic stage was brief, the impact of those early tournaments, particularly the 1924 Paris Games, continues to echo within the global polo community. As we approach the centenary of this historic event, it is fitting to reflect on the legacy of polo in the Olympics and the significance of the 2024 Paris Games Polo Challenge, a match designed to honor this rich heritage.

Polo's first foray into the Olympic Games occurred in 1900, during the Paris Games, a time when the modern Olympics were still in their infancy. The inclusion of polo was a natural fit; the sport, with its deep historical roots and aristocratic appeal, mirrored the international spirit that the Olympics sought to cultivate. Teams from France, Mexico, Spain, and the United States competed in that inaugural Olympic polo tournament, with Great Britain taking the gold medal. This victory not only marked a milestone for British polo but also highlighted the sport's global reach, as it brought together players and horses from across continents to compete on the world stage. >







The sport returned to the Olympics in 1908 in London, where it once again showcased the prowess of the British teams. However, it was the 1920 Antwerp Games that saw a significant shift, with Argentina emerging as a dominant force in international polo. The story of polo in the Olympic Games is one of both triumph and nostalgia. It is a tale of a sport that once graced the world's most prestigious athletic stage and left behind a legacy that continues to inspire. The 1924 Paris Games stand as a defining moment in this history, a time when the best in polo came together to create a spectacle that would be remembered for generations.

The 1936 Berlin Olympics marked the final appearance of polo as an official Olympic sport. This tournament was notable not only for its competitive spirit but also for the impressive performance of the Argentine team, who once again demonstrated their dominance in the sport. Held in the midst of a politically charged atmosphere, the 1936 Games saw Argentina defeat Great Britain 11-0 in the final match, securing their second Olympic gold medal in polo.

Despite the success of the 1936 Games, polo was not included in subsequent Olympics, marking the end of its official Olympic journey. The 2024 Paris Games Polo Challenge is not just a celebration of the past but a recognition of the sport's enduring appeal and its ability to unite players and fans across the globe.
