look back and feel the gratification of a job well done.

I look back and feel the pride of a task brought to completion at its highest possible success, with a staff who worked their best to achieve the goal.

I look back and feel the satisfaction of a dream come true.

Because, all in all, that is what the First Women's FIP World Cup was: a dream come true. Now that the tournament is over, with Argentina having won and the United States taking a solid Silver, with England, Italy, Brazil and Ireland having done a great job, with all that we've lived, I feel that, as we often say, reality was better than fiction.

Let's look back. The idea of hosting the First Women's Polo World Cup was born in February, 2019. Everyone in the Federation of International Polo was excited about it: it would be the next step for women's polo cycle of constant growth.


We talked to the Argentine Polo Association and they quickly accepted the challenge, and even set a date: they were interested in hosting it in April, 2020. The FIP's Women's Polo Committee started working to get the tournament's rules and regulations right. There were many things to figure out: handicaps, the amount of teams, organizations, etc.

However, that was when the pandemic hit and made things a lot more difficult. We were forced to delay the tournament. There was more bad news as well, as it made it impossible for Group D to participate, as traveling limitations were very strict on Australia and New Zealand and not even the qualifiers could be played.

However, we kept moving forward, with a pause on the work but nowhere near having stopped. When some normalcy returned, the World Cup returned as well, as one of the FIP's top priority.

On September, 2021, and thanks to the FISE's hard work, the European qualifiers were held in Milan, Italy. It is the region with the most women's team in the world, and the tournament was excellent, which showed us that we were on the right track.

In addition, with the FIP Women's Committee we share the idea that high goal tournaments should also have their share of international competition and that players with higher handicaps should



be able to compete for their countries. Thus, in the meantime between the World Cup Qualifiers and the World Cup in April 2022, and again with the support and hard work of the Argentine Polo Association, in December 2021 we had the first Women's Nations Cup held in Palermo, Argentina, the best location in the world for any polo tournament or event.

It was a high goal tournament, 16-22 goals, and the USA, England and Argentina fought fiercely to be the first winners (finally it was Argentina) in what we anticipate will be a very prestigious tournament to enter from now on. The idea is that it be carried out every two or three years alternately in the US, UK and Argentina.

Finally, only a few weeks ago, in April, 2022, women's polo had their first World Cup, and it was hugely successful, with every match played at the Polo Cathedral of Palermo being celebrated. Let me repeat and rephrase it: it was hugely successful, much more so than we had imagined. No one would have expected the tournament to do so well, and to have drawn so many people in. A lot of obstacles had to be overcome for this to happen, the most difficult of which was securing 120 horses that were safe and good for the tournament. I want to thank



the AAP and the whole of the Argentine polo community for helping us make that happen. There were six very close horse lots that were drawn between the teams, and most games were decided by a small margin.

All participating teams supported the tournament, showing great sportsmanship and camaraderie. It was very difficult to pick the Sportsmanship Award winner which finally was awarded to Frances Townend from England.

Lastly, I want to acknowledge Don Marcos Uranga and Glen Holden. They were the "fathers" of the FIP, and we are sure they would be proud to see this tournament held, and the growth of the Federation that they founded together with the support and help of many polo players from all over the world.

I look back and feel the gratification of a job well done.

A day polo will never forget



here was a question repeated over and over on Saturday, April 16th, 2022, on Palermo's #2 Field. A question unrelated to who would win the match between Argentina and the United States for the first Women's FIP World Cup final.

The question was: has Field 2 ever been this full before? That question was asked by friends, directives, colleagues, and anyone I came across. I could not remember another time with this many people on Field 2, and I asked others who might've had an answer.

I can only compare it to what happened in 2019, when brothers Camilo and Bartolome Castagnola debuted in Palermo and it was a boom. The difference is that at that time there was less excitement, and more admiration...


However, there was another difference: people were cheering louder this time. Even people who don't know about polo came close to look at this sport called polo. "I heard a few people ask "How many halves do they play?" which shows



that they were first timers, because they were asking about halves, not chukkers," said Guillermo Ricaldoni, from We Are Sports, the Triple Crown's commercial manager.

It might be difficult to have another day like this one, as there will be no chance to repeat some of these things: first time, Women's and Argentina. They are three concepts that draw people in, that create enthusiasm.

However, the Association of Polo (a round of applause for the outstanding organization), knowing that it might be impossible to repeat this, must look at the hard work they put in to make this day, April 16th, 2022, the day when history was written. A day that polo will never forget.





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A PERFECT ORGANIZATION FOR A PERFECT TOURNAMENT

Ithough the first Women's World Cup officially kicked off a couple of days before the ball started rolling with the Technical Meeting and Media Day, the work

that demanded an event of this magnitude started several months ago. Once all the countries committed their efforts to take part in competition, the organization had a difficult task ahead. To get, test and divide into six groups the 120 horses the teams would use.

Before the Media Day a Technical Meeting took place. A very significant reunion where the players and coaches from every country were explained the rules of the tournament, the use of the horses and where any doubts were put to rest. After this meeting the players received their official shirts.

With the players from the six teams ready to go and proudly wearing their countries shirts and boots the media attention started. And that was, perhaps, ▶

the most important thing. Many of the most relevant media from Argentina were present in the tournament's presentation that took place in the venue the Argentine Polo Association has in Pilar (Buenos Aires, Argentina).

Something positive that happened is that it attracted the attention of new people that were not linked to polo. It was new for the audience and also new for the media. The media that cover polo were there but also other media were covering a polo event for the first time. The main

newspapers and websites from Argentina were there and the most important national TV channel even did a live interview with Milo Fernandez Araujo, Azucena Uranga and Agustina Imaz at Palermo's Field 2 two days before the beginning of the World Cup.

There are several different reasons on why so many people attended the event. It is undeniable that one of those was the promotion that the AAP and FIP did alongside their marketing partners. The Media Day and the media coverage ▶

helped everything to go out perfectly. Following the media attention the teams tested the horses and practiced in front of the journalists that were present.

The horses were fundamental for everything to go out perfectly. 120 horses were used during the World Cup. 70 of them were lent while the other 50 were rented, all provided by the teams by the organization. The horses entered a lottery and the organization tried to give every team horses that were in similar conditions.

The teams were able to practice with their horses after the Media Day. As the

games went by and the players got used to them that also impacted directly on the level of the teams as each match was better than the one before. Something to highlight is that there were no accidents and the players were able to play a high level and safe polo.

While for the public in general the Women's World Cup lasted a week, a lot of people worked relentlessly during months to make sure the event was perfect. In the end, what happened in the field was just the tip of the iceberg.

THE BEST ENDING TO A GREAT MOVIE

The best ending for a great final for a historic tournament. Read 'historic' as being the first one ever. Argentina won the first Women's FIP Polo World Cup and, even though the tournament was a success before the results, the Argentine victory closed a great night.

Sporting wise, and playing on a brimming Field 2 in the Argentine Polo Field, with over 5,000 people watching, Argentina played perfectly against the United States. After a stalled start, the game began to open up starting on the second chukker. Agustina Imaz opened the scoring near the end of the second period, breaking the Americans' tough defenses so far. Another 1-0 win in the third and a 2-0 win in the fourth chukkers stretched the difference to 4-0 in favor of Argentina, with only two chukkers to go.

However, the US girls reacted and played at their best when hopping back onto the field. Still, it wasn't enough, splitting goals with the Argentine team and closing the game with a 6-2victory for Argentina.







Looking at each Argentine player, all four of them were excellent in their position, doing more than their share of the work. Azucena Uranga (chosen MVP of the final) fought for every inch of the field, passing to her teammates to score. Agus Imaz was a strong, effective forward.

Paulina Vasquetto was a wall in front of the team's own goal, and Catalina Lavinia, who was the youngest girl at 16, was the mastermind and top scorer of the team, with 10. They were guided by the polo legend Milo Fernandez Araujo, who coached the team to victory.







Regarding statistics, just like what happened in the first Men's World Cup in 1987, the Argentine team will go down in history as the first team to have won the Women's FIP World Cup, presented by RUS Fem, and played at the Argentine Polo Field in Palermo. Back then, the team featured Diego Dodero, Martin Vidou, Esteban Panelo and Bautista Heguy. Argentina is also the team that has won the Men's tournament the most, with five titles. Regarding the tournament itself, two things repeated in most of the eleven matches: good polo and vibrant matches. Italy won Group A after defeating the United States in the last

match of the bracket. Inglaterra finished first in Group B as they secured the victory against Argentina in a shootout. With these results, Brazil and Ireland, who lost their classification matches, faced off in the Bronze Cup with the South American side taking home the triumph. The semifinals were different. While Argentina overwhelmed Italy, the United States had to battle until the last bell to defeat England. The game for the Silver Cup between England and Italy was the most dramatic of all. England defeated Italy with a goal in the last second of the match. Later, with a fully crowded field, Argentina won the tournament.

35 years later, and with Delfin Uranga at the helm of the Argentine Association of Polo (his father Marcos created the men's tournament), women's polo wrote another page in history.

There were high expectations regarding the repercussions of the tournament, but even the most optimistic expectations were shattered: a fully packed Field 2, with people more excited than we've ever seen them, and doing what the sport struggles with the most: bringing new people closer to polo. ■





















THE WORLD CUP'S FANTASTIC HISTORY WITH THE URANGA FAMILY

The Federation of International Polo Women's World Cup, co-organized by the Argentine Association of Polo, took place at the Palermo Fields in Buenos Aires, Argentina. And, when comparing both entities, a last name repeats itself: Uranga. The same name that also appears on the Argentine team. The names are respectively Marcos, his son Delfin and his granddaughter Azucena.

Marcos Uranga was one of the biggest promoters of polo around the world. He founded the Federation in 1982 and promoted the creation of the first Men's World Cup in 1987, played in Buenos Aires with the local team taking the title. Delfin Uranga took charge of the AAP last year. Under his term, Argentina hosted the first Women's FIP World Cup. Azucena, on the other hand, won the title with Argentina and also received the Most Valuable Player award.

To top it off, Azucena is part of the team. All of it means this tournament is very special for our family."

special relation with the public as they root for their country. Something extraordinary that happened in Palermo was that everyone who came to cheer for Argentina were really passionate about what was happening, regardless >











Horacio, you watched many games here at Palermo Field 2. Can you recall a game with such enthusiasm?



I spoke to the girls from the six teams and they were super happy, excited and most of all they were very proud as they made history, as everyone says, to be the first players to take part in a Women's World Cup.

If I have to speak as an Argentine, not as the president of FIP, all I can say is that I also feel very proud to see the first Women's World Cup taking place in my country, the same way the first Men's World Cup did 35 years ago. This will be in the books and it brings me great satisfaction. ▶






ARGENTINA ALSO WON THE FIRST WOMEN'S NATIONS CUP

In another demonstration of just how relevant women's polo is these days, Argentina hosted at Palermo Field 2 the first Women's Nations Cup. Argentina, the United States and England presented three very competitive teams between 22 and 23 goals. Argentina and England faced off in the final match after they both defeated the US team. Argentina won the game 8-2 and secured the trophy. After a successful first tournament, FIP aims to repeat this event in other countries with more teams joining in the next editions.

After a slow start, where Argentina led 2-1 at halftime, the local team pushed hard in the second half to claim an 8-2 victory. Milagros Sanchez scored five goals for Argentina, Lia Salvo two and Azucena Uranga the one remaining. Milly Hine and Hazel Jackson scored the English goals. The MVP of the final was Lia Salvo and the BPP Tan Zorra, played by Azucena Uranga.











The competition took place after the V Women's Argentine Open. It has two 10 goal players, Lia Salvo and Hazel Jackson, and six players that played only days before in the Open.

The trophies were presented by Delfin Uranga, president of the Argentine Polo Association, Horacio Areco, president of the Federation of International Polo (FIP), Alex Taylor, CEO of FIP and Ricardo Mihanovich, Chairman of FIP's Ambassadors Cup Committee. ■







ITALY WON THE LADIES EUROPEAN

A fantastic Italian team triumphed in the final of the third edition of the U.S. Polo Assn. FIP Ladies European Polo Championship, at the Polo Club La Mimosa in Pogliano Milanese. The Italian team defeated England 6½-6 thanks to a ½ handicap advantage. In the final for third and fourth positions it was Ireland that outscored Germany 5-3 in a penalty shootout after the match had been canceled due to bad conditions following heavy rain.

It was a very exciting final played on a field that held up in spite of the heavy rain. England needed to come back after starting off half a goal down and began strongly with Heloise Wilson Smith brilliantly exploiting a defensive indecision by the Italians early on in the game. The host team reacted quickly, in particular with Camila Rossi scoring from 40 yards after a penalty and ending the first chukka 1-1.

The English took the lead in the second chukka in which goals were scored first by Emma Tomlinson Wood, from 40 yards and then by Millie Hughes, who close to the goal posts managed to score off an amazing backhander played by Wilson Smith.

In this fast-changing scenario Italy came back to 3-3 with two goals by Rossi, but it was England who was in the lead at the end of the fourth chukka on 4-3, following a penalty that Wood put through the goal posts.



The Italians played a real leading role in a fifth chukka that will be remembered, with three goals scored by Rossi and the other rider of Italian origin Maitena Marré.

England reacted strongly back at 6-4 for Italy scoring two more goals thanks to Wilson Smith and Hughes, but on 6-6 the team coached by Franco Piazza controlled
